





# **Holy Nativity Today**



### HIGHLIGHTS OF OUR CHURCH HISTORY

1927 February Organized as an independent Lutheran Congregation. 1927 March First Sunday School service 1927 April 10<sup>th</sup> First worship service held. Rev. Paul Roetling preaching. 1929 Construction started on basement church. 1943 Rev. Enno Schmoock accepted call and was installed as pastor. 1947 Rev. Walter V. Roe accepted call and was installed as pastor. 1950 Dedication of church of Linden and High view. 1952 Christian Kindergarten began. 1960 Property at Linden and Shelbourne purchased. (5.6 acres) 1963 Rev. Albert Bielenberg accepted call and was installed as pastor. 1967 Building plans on Linden and Shelbourne property. 1973 March from "old church" to "new church". 1975 Pastor Roger Fink called as pastoral assistant. 1978 Rev. Arthur Scherer accepted call and was installed as pastor. 1980 Fire destroys a portion of the church building. 1981 Rededication of repaired and expanded building. 1984 Rev. Gerald Reiter installed as Assistant Pastor. 1984 Deacon Vincent Hammel installed as Holy Nativity's first deacon. 1991 Establishment of three lay positions; Director of Education, Youth, and Outreach. 1994 Rev. James Bredeson accepted call and was installed as pastor. 1998 First Contemporary Service 2001 Eric Sommer was installed as Holy Nativity's second deacon. 2002 Visit from Synod President Kieschnick in the celebration of 75 years of existence. 2003 March New Family Life Center dedicated. 2003 Sept. Rev. Allen L. Behnke accepted call and installed as pastor. 2006 Church YouTube Established Rev. Andrew Okai accepted to be interim Pastor 2008 July 2009 June Established our food pantry 2009 June Pastor Andrew Okai called as Pastor of Holy Nativity 2013 May New Outdoor Digital sign is approved 2013 June Women's Ministry is established 2013 Sep. Pastor Meilander joined HNLC 2014 March Our Current Vision statement was adopted 2014 April First Annual Golf Tournament at Willow Springs Golf Course 2014 June Approval to replace roof and repair steeple \$65,000 2014 Sep. Introduction of Pastor Cary Moorman 2014 Sep. Tree of faith approved for church wall 2015 April Passion play performed at church 2016 April Fanning the Flame cottage meetings held 2017 April Pastor Zam Khai and family joins HNLC 2018 June Security Task Force Established for HNLC 2018 June Food pantry served 147 families in 1st quarter of year 2019 Jan. # **First Events**

Here are some items of interest in the history of our Congregation during the time of the organization of Holy Nativity.

The first baptism in the basement church was Carolyn Babetta Siebert. The last baptism in the basement church was David L. Buettner in May, 1949.

The Church was then torn down to make room for construction of the new church and it was noted that David Elseroad had to be baptized in the home due to the building of the new church. The first baptism at Linden and Highview was that of John Williams Adams, Jr., on March 12, 1950 and the last was Nikki Lynn Harvey on February 11, 1973. The first baptism at our present location was Tamara Eileen Hurley on April 7, 1973.

# **First Events**

The first marriage recorded is that of Matthew Boring and Lillian Stamm on January 17, 1930. The first in the basement church was Harry Richardson and Elizabeth Niepraschk on September 23, 1936. The last wedding in the basement was Walter Hellman and Margaret Herzog on May 28, 1949. The first wedding in the new church at Linden and Highview was Richard Custy and Audrey Crawford on October 4, 1950. The last wedding at that location was John Owen and Carroll Lee Russell on January 16, 1973. The first wedding at Linden and Shelbourne was that of John Hartman and Susan Priebe on February 10, 1973 with scaffolds yet in place and the building incomplete.



# **The Stained Glass**

CHRIST is the WAY and the LIGHT as well as the TRUTH and the LIFE! The illuminated cross whose rays reach out into infinity has been conceived abstractly, yet will be easily recognizable to all who seek and to all who have found the spiritual answer to man's existence through belief in Christ.

From the center Cross other crosses appear to emanate one after the other pervading not only this world. but also the universe. The blues and purples through the design not only attempt to convey the feeling of limitless space, but also the eternal mystery of the love of Christ and the workings of the Holy Spirit. The Red represents the ever-present God with us on earth (browns) and the yellow give an uplifting feeling and hope.





The windows tell a story about the life and work of Christ. Beginning on the organ side in the front we have the Nativity with Christ represented in the Christmas rose (red) and this leads us into His baptism (shell) with the sky opening up and the water flowing (blue). The coming of the Holy Spirit and His saving work among us is depicted by the dove (blue). This brings us into the Sacraments and God's gifts in field and vineyard that become gifts of Bread and Wine, Body and Blood - gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation for the Church. Yet, the great gift was that His Son came to die! Sometimes that was not clearly seen, but that purpose unfolded more and more as Christ lived and preached among men. The large rear window reminds us of the events of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Jesus committed Himself into the care and keeping of God. In a last Supper Christ gave us Himself, and upon a Cross He died for the sins of the world. On the Linden Avenue side, the windows then pick up the theme of resurrection and life and eternal life. This again is seen by the colors used and by the symbols interwoven. Christ conquers and Christ rules and Christ lives and reigns, one God forever. Christ is indeed King and this is the message in the crown and the cross which stands in relationship to the world.

Jean Jacques Duval, master designer of stained glass windows, was born in France and studied at Ecole Des Arts Decoratifs in Strasbourg and at the School of Sacred Arts in Paris before coming to the U.S. in 1950. Since then he has completed over two hundred commissions for churches, synagogues, and residences all over the U.S., including the windows in the Vatican Pavilion at the 1964 World's Fair in New York. Duval's designing is always assured and bold and well integrated with the architecture of the building. His credo is succinctly stated: "Integrity of design within the limits of the medium, Sensitive expression of a spiritual message in architectural terms, opportunity for creative drama, utilizing the idiom of our own culture and era."



Depending on the season, the sky outside shines through and tells a beautiful story with changing colors. Yet the message remains the same. Where there is God, there is light and beauty. There is hope.
